PATCH-WEARING POLICY

Wear them if you got them

Should patches be worn at all? What if the referees have different certification levels? What if one line judge has earned Line Judge Certification, but the other has not?

Each year PAVO fields several questions about the proper protocols for wearing patches on the uniform shirt, and the PAVO Board of Directors tackled this topic when it met in March. The board adopted the following guidelines:

Referees should wear their PAVO referee certification patch unless the entity that hired them for a particular match has asked them to wear a conference patch or no patch.

Both of the referees who are working a match can choose independently to wear either the patch that indicates their certification level (State, National, Local, etc.) or the "generic" patch offered by PAVO - even if the referees' certification levels are different.

Line judges who are certified should wear that patch at all matches, unless the hiring entity asks them not to. Even if one line judge is certified and the other is not, the certified line judge can and should wear the certification patch. Certification means successfully completing the Line Judge Certification program.

So wear your certification proudly!

BALL HANDLING DIRECTIVE FOR 2008

A great deal of the clinic content this year is focused on the new Ball Handling Directive that the NCAA Women's make a good set. Volleyball Rules Committee developed.


There are rumors on the street that the directive gives referees permission to not call anything. That's simply not true. Part of the Directive is simply a reiteration of the message we've been delivering for several years. Don't call ball handling faults based on spin, technique, or other assumptions. Don't let the presumptions of the coaches, players or fans influence you. Only blow your whistle when you actually see ball handling or thrown, or you actually see two nonsimultaneous contacts on a second or third team directive is instructing us to be vigilant about our ball handling judgments in those terms.

There is a part of the Ball Handling Directive that is new information. The directive now gives us permission to be more lenient in certain situations, and is to be particularly emphasized on second team contacts that are not sent to the opponent. Referees are encouraged to be "less severe" when a player makes an athletic play, particularly if they make that play from a "less than ideal" position. We have all had those times when a really spectacular play had to be "shot down" with of us had that sinking feeling when we had to Well, now we don't have to. We can allow the slight double contact.

calls are a thing of the past! The player must earn the leniency. As the directive says, "clumsiness or lack of skill must not be confused with athleticism". The intent is not to reward a setter who is late getting to the ball or who makes a minimal effort to

Does this change make you uncomfortable? You're not alone! Will you have to step up and apply even more judgment to an already subjective area of officiating? Absolutely! But can we do this? YES, we can! Sometimes the very nature of referees' personalities tends to put us in a black/white world. We live by rules, we perfect techniques that make us look like everyone else. But in virtually every sport, there are some areas where the excellent officials are those that can use that breaks a rule - that means the ball is caught the rules plus their best judgment to make decisions. Basketball referees do it every night regarding fouls. They don't call a foul when there contact. None of that has changed, but the is contact between players the same way under the basket as they do at the top of the key. And that's not in the rules - it's trained. I've heard football officials say "there is a hold on every play". But they start teaching those officials from the earliest entry-level which holds are to be called.

If all of volleyball officiating were black and white, then anyone could be a referee. And that's simply not true. We must be judicious and true students of the game in order to make this change, but we can do it. Watch other referees, and every chance you get, discuss why they made (or did not make) certain calls. Get out before the season starts, and a whistle because of a slight double contact. Most practice at your local college or university scrimmage. Start now developing your judgment. make that call - we hated to kill the exciting play. It may take us a while to develop the new standards and establish consistency, but in the great athletes on the court to keep the ball in play long run, the referees that are able to make this with an extraordinary effort, even if the result is a transition will be those who rise to the top of our game.



EVEN THE LONE RANGER WORKED AS A TEAM

Do you know how many officials are needed for a regular volleyball match? One. That's how a few officials in their own little world operate in some matches regardless of who's working with them. These lone rangers act as though they're good enough to get by without much help from anyone else. Hello! These people definitely need help. No one is that good. The Lone Ranger himself was good, but even he didn't work alone.

Attitude makes a big difference. A normal match has at least six officials - first referee, second referee, scorekeeper, libero tracker and two line judges. All functions are essential and dependent on one another. Sure, everyone wants to be a star. Sorry folks, this isn't Hollywood. Park that ego. It's not about you, it's not about me, it's about us. It's a team, only as strong as its weakest member, similar to an orchestra. All must mesh together as one to produce the sweetest sounds. If one or two wander off on their own, the chemistry is ruined. If the team fails, all share the blame. If the team shines, all share the bravos.

The first referee conducts the show and sets the tone. A smart R1 lets everyone do their job and keeps them in tune. A one-man band of an R1 trying to do everything is foolish if not blind. Three other pairs of eyes and hands are on board. Trust them. The second referee and line judges are motivated to work harder when treated as peers, not lackeys.

An R1 is wise to glance at the R2 right away for possible signaled input when certain situations arise during a rally: 1) a ball handling error screened from view, 2) "2" or "4" hits after an attack

rebounds back from the top of the net, 3) "ball down" on a pancake, 4) "reaching over the net" by a player, 5) "illegal back row block or attack" by a back row player at the net, or 6) "illegal back row attack" at the attack line by a back row attacker or a libero setting the ball with finger action. Often, violations are missed or calls disputed because the R1 ignored the R2 in these instances. In extreme cases, the R2 gave up on the R1.

Communication between the R1 and line judges is vital. Line judges are of all abilities, from wide-eyed pre-teens who can walk upright under a net to eagle-eyed referees drafted for duty. Sometimes, the youngsters pay more attention, but that's beside the point. Line judges are only as good as the R1 makes them. Why does an R1 instruct the line judges for five minutes or more before the match then seldom make eye contact with them unless absolutely needed during the match? Go figure. Anyway, that R1 will probably get consistent reactions from the line judges who may go to sleep in the briefing and match. Use them or lose them.

The scorekeeper can save the R2 from many sticky score-related issues and vice versa. Therefore, the scorekeeper can't hang onto the score sheet like a private prize while the R2 mustn't look down on the scorekeeper. Children, you need each other. Let's get in sync to run things smoothly. The same can be said between the scorekeeper and libero tracker.

At least six officials make up a match crew. To be most effective, there can't be any lone rangers among them doing their own thing. Teamwork is what gets the job done best.



2007 PAVO EXAMINATIONS REPORT

More PAVO officials opted for the online exam option in 2007, a year in which several changes to the examination process were implemented.

Although the exam is still a joint PAVO/USAV project, there were actually two separate Form A/B versions developed, one for each rule code. Whenever possible, questions were paralleled from one version to the other, changing terminology (and the correct answer) when necessary. Test-takers no longer had the option of taking the test one time and have it count for both organizations.

This change allowed for the elimination of the five "rules specific" questions at the end of the joint exam, which was the norm before 2007. Those questions were replaced with a short section of optional technique/procedure questions. The technique portion of the test was taken by 911 of the 1,122 officials who took the on-line exam.

The average scores for the question on the proper signal sequence to end a rally and the question on the signal to indicate a center line fault were answered correctly by 97 percent of test takers. However, the average scores on the three remaining techniques questions ranged from 63 to 78 percent. Results such as those are passed on to the PAVO OTP clinicians to help determine topics to be covered in the clinic curriculum.

The online exam option continues to grow in popularity in

2007. A total of 1,122 PAVO's 2,200 members opted to take the test online, up from 703 in 2006. Let me encourage you to go now to your online member record, and opt for the online examination format. It's a user-friendly process, and you can take the examination when you are best prepared. You still can have discussion groups about examination topics, or use the examination in formal interpretation meetings. The actual task of taking the exam and getting the score to your board chair and any coordinators/assignors that you work for can be taken care of quickly and easily.

Having more members take the test online provides us great data to use to analyze test questions and results to increase the efficacy of future exams. We can determine which test questions were missed the most, and review those for clarity and readability.

Many of you have already taken the 2008 examination, and others still have that task to do. As you take this year's test (or review your results before working your first match), please remember to thank those who work hard to make sure the examination is an effective teaching and testing tool.

Deadline extended to Sept. 1; elections in October

The PAVO Board of Directors has extended the deadline for nominations for its fall election to Sept. 1. Two positions are open: president-elect and director at large.

In October, PAVO members will be asked to vote via electronic ballot for these two positions.

The president will serve four years, from 2009-2012. The first year will be as president-elect, the second and third years as president, and the fourth year as past president. As president-elect and past president, this officer will chair the Nominating and Honor Award committees and carry out other duties as assigned by the president. As president, the successful candidate will direct the affairs of the board, preside at all meetings, set agendas. and represent PAVO at other volleyball and officiating gatherings. The president must have previous board experience or have served in leadership positions on his or her local PAVO boards.

The director at large will serve a three-year term, from 2009-2011. This officer is required to attend annual meetings (held in February or March), foster positive relationships with local PAVO boards by addressing local board and member issues that arise, and undertake other assignments as directed by the president.

Both positions require a PAVO member in good standing.

USA-INTERNATIONAL REFEREE COMMISSION

By Tom Blue. AVP. USA-International Referee Commission

The 31st FIVB World Congress was held in Dubai this past 16th and 17th of June. Among other items, the Congress approved several changes in the Rules of A player interferes with the opponent's play by the Game. Several other Rules will be amended as a consequence of other specific decisions of the Congress. Most of these Rule changes will go into effect immediately following the Olympic Games in Beijing. Others will go into effect as of January 2009.

Remember that the Domestic Competition Regulations will not be amended to conform to the FIVB Rules until the next competition year begins in August 2009. The following are the changes made in the FIVB Rules of the Game:

TEAM COMPOSITION

- 4.1.1 A team consists of a maximum of 14 players.
- 4.3.3 For Senior FIVB World and Official Competitions, players' jerseys must be numbered from 1-20 as registered in the O-2 form.

ABSENCE OF COACH

5.3.2 - Should the coach have to leave his/ her team for 15.10.3a - The request for substitution is the entrance any reason including sanction, the assistant coach may, at the request of the game captain and with the authorization of the first referee, assume the coach's functions for the duration of the absence.

MODIFICATION TO CENTER LINE RULE

CONTACT WITH THE NET

INTERFERING (PLAYER'S FAULTS AT THE NET)

(amongst others):

- touching the top band of the net or the antenna during his/her action of playing the ball, or
- touching the net simultaneous with playing the ball
- creating an unfair advantage over the opponent, or
- making actions which hinder an opponent's legitimate attempt to play the ball.

11.3.2 - Players may touch the post, ropes, or any other object outside the antennae, including the net itself, provided that it does not interfere with play.

INJURED PLAYERS

15.7 - A player (except the Libero) who cannot continue playing due to injury or illness should be substituted legally. If this is not possible, the team is entitled to make an EXCEPTIONAL substitution, beyond limits of Rule 15.6.

SUBSTITUTION PROCEDURES

of the substitute player(s) into the substitution zone, ready to play, when the ball is out of play and before the whistle for service.

15.10.3.b - If that is not the case, the substitution is not granted and the team is sanctioned for a delay.

15.10.3c - The request for substitution is acknowledged and announced by the scorer or second referee, by use of the buzzer/ whistle respectively.

15.10.4 - If a team intends to make simultaneously more than one substitution, all players being substituted must report to the substitution zone at the 11.3.1 - Contact with the net by a player is not a fault, same time to be considered in the same request. In

this case, substitutions must be made in succession. one pair of players after another.

In conjunction with the above,

- o It is still, therefore, possible to request substitution - e.g. in the case of an injury/ before the match starts/ for exceptional substitution or in non-FIVB competitions with no access to buzzers.
- o Whether verbally requested or not, the actual request is the entry of the player into the substitution zone; this prevents confrontation between the second referee and the coach, or the imposition of delay sanctions.
- o The second referee is still responsible for authorizing all substitutions - even with the new procedures; the scorer is empowered to acknowledge them, and announces them with the charge of the buzzer for the Libero replacement analyze the impact on the game. faults - but not until the service hit.

LIBERO PLAYER

- 19.1.1 Among the final list of 14 players (O-2bis Form), the National Federation MUST register 2 MISCONDUCT specialist defensive Libero players.
- 19.1.2 Liberos must be recorded on the score sheet aggressive or threatening behavior. before the match in the special lines reserved for this. 19.1.3 - For any match, the coach must register the actual Libero to be used in the match at the same time as delivering the line up sheet.
- 19.3.2.3 A replacement made after the whistle for REFEREE COOPERATION service but before the service hit should not be rejected but must be the object of a verbal caution after 22.2.3.3 - In the case of an attack hit fault by back row the end of the rally.

Subsequent late replacements shall result in the play being interrupted immediately and the imposition of a delay sanction. The team to serve next will be Note: First Referee whistles (amongst other things): determined by the result of the delay sanction.

- 19.3.2.4 The Libero and the replacing player may only enter or leave the court by the "Libero Replacement Zone".
- 19.3.2.5 The consequences of an illegal Libero replacement are the same as for a rotational fault.
- 19.3.3.1 The coach has the right to replace the acting Libero with the reserve Libero, but only once in the

match, and only after the regular replacement player has returned to court.

Injury Situations:

In case of illness or injury to the new (re-designated) Libero, he/she may be replaced accordingly:

- o By another player who the coach decides to play as a re-designated Libero.
- In this case the injured Libero may not return to play in this match.
- This player may be any player on the bench at the moment of the re-designation

Subsequent matches:

The original Libero or the reserve Libero may play in a subsequent match.

Second Referee whistles (amongst other things):

The completed block by back row players or the attempted block by the Libero, or the attack hit fault by back row players or by the Libero.

25.2.2.3 - The Scorer: (in cooperation with the Second Referee)

Is empowered to acknowledge and announce requests for player substitutions by use of the buzzer, controlling their number, and records the substitutions and time-outs, informing the second referee.

Clarifications to wording:

- 1. New definition: Libero Replacement Zone the sideline in front of the team bench between the attack line and the end line.
- 2. Rallies where a point is scored are called "completed rallies". "Loss of rally" becomes "a point and service to the opponent".
- 3. Clarification: The ball that is heading towards the opponent's court through the lower space may be kept in play provided that it has not completely crossed the vertical plane of the net at the moment of the hit.
- 4. An "interruption" is the time between one completed rally and the next.

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
